



Matchbook Memories

LEAVING BRADLEY PART IV

Leaving Bradley has become almost a mystic experience for me. Even though I have been gone from Bradley for many years, I have a kind of mystic connection to that place I knew so many years ago. At unexpected times, in totally unrelated places, I may suddenly experience a flashback that takes my mind back to people, places, and events that occurred long ago.

I have read that there are just so many different types of people and that all other people are just slight variations of those certain types. Perhaps that is true. I often meet people who instantly remind me of someone I knew at Bradley long ago. Sometimes a voice will take me back to Bradley. Occasionally, a laugh will remind me of I someone I knew long ago. Perhaps I choose some of my friends because they remind me of someone I knew back then. I am certain that I like to associate with people I would have been comfortable with at Bradley.

For example, I have a coffee drinking friend named Curtis Rushing, a retired Oklahoma Highway Patrolman. Curtis was notorious in Western Oklahoma as the "Weatherford Bear." He wrote more tickets than any other patrolman I ever knew. In fact, in the 1970s, a group of truckers put out a contract on Curtis to have him killed. The FBI sent out a team to investigate. They offered to provide him with personal security. Curtis told them he could take care of himself. Curtis grew up in Madill in much the same environment I knew at Bradley. We love to swap Madill and Bradley stories, which sometimes are eerily similar. When our coffee drinking group is really rolling with "tall tales," Curtis sometimes begins his stories with, "Doc and I grew up in the same kind of place." If Curtis and I had both lived in Bradley, I think we would have been good

friends.
Although Weatherford bears little resemblance to Bradley in my boyhood, there are still times when I suddenly feel as if I have been transported back in time. Today

it was 95 degrees in Weatherford. Only a slight breeze stirred the pine and cedar trees in my back yard. The soft green fescue grass under the trees gave off a cool feeling. I was reminded of the cool shade of elm trees at the end of sweltering broomcorn rows. I stood in my yard savoring the shade under the trees and the memory of broomcorn fields long ago.

This weekend I was fishing with my son, Chad, and my grandson, Walker. We fished from our boat on Saturday, but on Sunday afternoon, we drove to Lake Vanderwork to see what the lake was like and to do some bank fishing. We found a shady spot under a large cottonwood tree. The white fuzz from the cottonwood tree was drifting down around us. Just after we arrived, I caught a large carp. As I reeled the fish in and watched the cottonwood fuzz drift down lazily in the breeze, I suddenly remembered a late afternoon when I was about fifteen. My brother, Jack, my nephew, Newt, and I were fishing on the Washita River on Henry Rogers' farm. A large cottonwood tree hung out over the bank. The white fuzz from the tree drifted down and floated on the water. We had cane poles stuck in the muddy bank. Suddenly my pole bent sharply and began to shake. As I grabbed the pole and yanked on it, a large carp came to the surface. It was the biggest fish I had ever caught at the time. As I reeled in my large carp last Sunday, that scene from sixty years ago returned to my mind in all of its detail.

That kind of event happens to me often, almost always associated with my Bradley years. All of those memories are stored up in my mind, waiting for some small event to set them in motion. It is almost mystic the way the mind works. Although I left Bradley many years ago, the memories I have of that place are forever with me, waiting to surprise me at unexpected times.

For many people, the largest investment they'll make is the purchase of a house or land. Because of that, we're all very protective of our property, no matter how large or how small.

That's why I'm disappointed that a measure which would have strengthened Oklahoma's personal property laws wasn't able to override a veto from the governor last week. The governor said he vetoed the bill because it was poorly drafted, conflicts with an earlier trespass law that he signed and creates a situation that would penalize honest sportsmen.

Actually, this bill would not apply if the trespass was casual and involuntary. This was a good measure, which is why the House brought it back in an attempt to override the veto. It needed 67 votes to sustain the override, but only garnered 62 votes.

Like many Oklahomans, I believe in supporting farmers and ranchers however possible. And this bill would have made it tougher on those who chose to trespass on their property. This measure, House Bill 2547, would also require convicted trespassers to compensate landowners for actual detriment to crops and livestock not less than three times nor more than

10 times the damage.

One of the points I liked most about the bill was that it would hike up the minimum fine for a trespassing charge from \$50 to \$500. It could have also resulted in the loss of a hunting and/or fishing license for up to a year, if caught on someone else's land without permission.

However, there are some who choose to ignore fences and go where they please and, well, that's just wrong. Detractors of this bill say that it's sometimes hard to distinguish where one piece of property begins or ends. I disagree. More often than not, a person's property is
