Troy Rodgers, 54, born and raised in the small town Bradley, Oklahoma, now residing in Houston, Texas, is the inventor of the Versa-Rig, a combination snubbing unit and well-service rig unlike any other on the market.

Troy's is the son of Hap and Audreu Rogers. He is the nephew of Lindsay News columnist Jerry Nye.

"The name stands for versatile rig because this rig can do so many things," Rodgers said. "It's all together just leaps and bounds above anything else out there."

The Versa-Rig saves oil and gas production companies time and therefore money. It can change the oilfield industry, Rodgers said.

The free-standing, mobile rig travels on tracks so it can easily be moved. This enables operators to work on multiple wells that have been drilled on a site without taking the rig down. The unit can be moved in less that 30 minutes, Rodgers said. Because it is smaller in size than other rigs, the Versa-Rig can be in operation on a location at the same time as a drilling rig.

Traditional well-service rigs require more complicated setups and must be disassembled to move. They also are too large to work on site with a drilling rig, so operators have to wait until the drilling rig is ready to move to come on site.

> "The offshore rig was an old unit, and I was thinking how dangerous it was," he said. He woke up about 2 a.m. the next morning and couldn't get back to sleep, so he went to the kitchen to get something to eat.

> "I'm always thinking, so I took a pen and piece of paper with me to draw on," he said. "It just came to me. I drew up the Versa-Rig on that piece of paper that night."

From that nighttime brainstorming session, it took Rodgers 14 months to design, build and put the rig in operation.

Versa-Rig's headquarters is located in Houston, Texas with a branch office in Parachute, Colorado.

FOURTH OF JULY MEMORIES

This is a reprint of my "Matchbook Memories" article from June 28, 2001. It reflects the spirit of the Bradley I remember from long ago.

The Fourth of July was an exciting holiday in my younger years. When I was growing up at Bradley, the Fourth of July meant fireworks, swimming, watermelons, and a one-day vacation from the broomcorn fields and the hay patches. In those days before city ordinances against fireworks, we could shoot the huge firecrackers, Roman candles, red devils, torpedoes, and cherry bombs wherever we dared.

In spite of the power of the fireworks, I never knew anyone who suffered a permanent injury, although we all remember minor burns and ringing ears. On the Main Street of Bradley, we shot the fireworks for several days before the Fourth of July and fired a veritable barrage on July 4.

In my teenage years, we bought our fireworks in Bomhak's Cafe. The front showcase would be filled with a variety of fireworks -packages of small Black Cat firecrackers, huge cherry bomb firecrackers that would blow a tin can in pieces, red devils that sped in unexpected directions with an ear piercing scream, Roman candles that shot colored balls high in the sky, and torpedoes that exploded when they were thrown on the street or against a wall. We cared little for sparklers. We wanted a loud bang for our money, the louder the better.

We generally shot our snakes, and the girls were

generally friendly. On the Fourth of July in 1950, Joe Bill Rayburn sat on me under the water at Shannon Springs until I nearly drowned. After we had finished swimming, we would go back to Bradley to shoot fireworks until late that night. fireworks on the Main Street Watermelons were

always a part of the Fourth of July. But in those days, we didn't have town watermelon feeds as we do now in many towns on the Fourth of July. When I go to the Fourth of July picnic in Weatherford, free watermelon is served everywhere. At Bradley we had to find our watermelons.

On the farm, we grew our own watermelons. But when we moved to town, some of us would "liberate" some watermelons from farmers who had more than they could ever use. I recall some of my friends "sharing" some of their own fathers' watermelons with their buddies, much to the disapproval of their fathers. We would sometimes take the watermelons to the Bradley School ground and eat them in the moonlight as we watched the fireworks from Main Street. Sometimes our Fourth of July celebration would last until midnight or later. We enjoyed the fireworks, the swimming, and the watermelons, but as we wended our weary way home, we knew what the next day would bring. No matter how late we went to bed, at 7 a.m. the next morning, we would be in the broomcorn field, itching from the broomcorn fuzz, sweating under the fierce sun, and laboring to harvest that most punishing crop. But, in our minds, we would relive the excitement of the fireworks, the sweet taste of watermelons, and the feel of the cool waters of Shannon Springs.

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

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Under Cover Of Darkness Tours To Be Held At Wichitas

Wildlife Refuge will be conducting Under Cover of Darkness Tours for the general public on July 12, 19 and 26. Reservations are required and are taken on a first-come, first-served basis beginning Monday, June 30, 2008.

Participants will have an opportunity to learn about nighttime activities of wildlife. The tours are led by members of the Association of the Friends of the Wichitas. Interpreters will assist visitors in understanding the management practices of the Refuge for all species of animals and their habitats, especially those associated with the night. Flashlights are recommended for safety in moving to and from the bus. Due to the length of the tours, children must be at least eight years of age to participate.

Tour participants should meet at the Visitor Center, located at the intersection of Highways 49 and 115. Visitors may obtain a Refuge leaflet and map from one of the dispensers located at each of the five entrances. The bus will depart from the Visitor Center parking-lot promptly at 8 p.m. on Saturdays, July 12, 19, and 26. A \$5.00 per person reservation fee will be collected at the time of check-in. Reservations will

Western and country entertainers, Western film stars, authors and cowboy poets highlight this year's Gene Autry Oklahoma Film and Music Festival, held Septmeber 24-28 at the Gene Autry Oklahoma Museuam.

Advance tickets are now on sale for this event that put the tiny town of Gene Autry, OK on the map. It's located about 12 miles northeast of Ardmore, just east of Interstate 35. The town took its name from film star Gene Autry, who owned a ranch there in the 30s and 40s.

Country super star Gene Watson whose hits include "Paper Rosie" and "Farewell Party," heads a strong list of headline performers that includes Les Gilliam, the Oklahoma Balladeer; Johnny Westrn, who played for both Gene Autry, and Johnny Cash; and Eli Barsi, known as "Canada's Cowglrl." Others to be featured include Judy Coder and Pride of the Prairie, a Kansas-based Oklahoma Film and Music Western ensemble; singer/ songwriter Terry Smith ("Far-side Banks of Jordan"); the hilarious O'Roark Brothers: and Western swing/ rockabilly singer Liz Talley from Houston. Film star guests at the Film and Music Festival include Robert Fuller (Laramie), Barry Corbin (Lonesome Dove), Lisa Montell (Gunsmoke, Maverick), Roberta Shore (The Virginian) and Don Reynolds, Jr. (Little Beaver). (Mr. Corbin will be attending if he is not involved in a film project at that time.) Authors and celebrities confirmed include Bobby Copeland, author of 14 books about various aspects of the B-Western films; Joyce Spizer Foy and Judy Keel, author of Only Make Believe, a biography of actor Howard Keel; and Cheryl Rogers Barnett, daughter of Roy Rogers and Dale Evans. Celebrity MC's include Tommy Wiggins, John Buttram, and Jo Hargrave. The event includes showings of various B-Western films and a new film called Trail End, produced by Shannon Keenan and starring Barry Corbin. The Gene Watson Show will be held Friday evening, September 26, and includes The O'Roark Brothers, Eli Barsi, and Liz Talley. The Les Gilliam Show will be Saturday evening, September 27, and will include performances by

Johnny Western, Judy Coder, and Pride of the Prairie and Terry Smith.


