I'm Selena Gilliam, a sophomore at Lindsay High School. Over the summer, I had the incredible opportunity to go to the United Kingdom and Ireland with a People to People Student Ambassadors delegation. There were 38 other students in my group, along with 4 leaders, all of whom were from Oklahoma.

I was pretty nervous about my trip, at first. After all, I had never even been on a plane before, let alone fly overseas. But all was well. Aside from a few delays, the plane rides weren't bad at all. I even made a few friends hanging out at the airports. I landed in Edinburgh, Scotland at 7:30 A.M. The hard part was adjusting to the weather. It was very cold in Scotland, about 50 degrees and rainy most of the time (although it was my favorite place we visited; it was so beautiful!). But once we had moved on to Ireland, Wales, and England, we had awesome weather.

It ended up being a ton of fun, though. I even tried

Bugling Elk Tours To Be Held At The Wichitas

The Wichita Mountains Wildlife Refuge will be conducting "Bugling Elk" tours for the general public from September 6 through October 10. Reservations are required and are taken on a first-come, first-served basis beginning Monday, August 24, 2009.

The tours will take participants into the Refuge's Special Use Area during the height of the elk mating season, a unique opportunity for wildlife viewing. At this time of year the bull elk compete for available females to form their harems. To vent their feelings of frustration and aggression, the bull elk produces a high-pitched whistling sound. Tour participants have the opportunity to hear the bugling and to view elk in their natural habitat. Members from the Association of Friends of the Wichitas serve as Interpretive guides for the tours.

Tour participants will meet at the Refuge Visitor Center located at the intersection of Highways 49 and 115. Visitors may obtain a Refuge leaflet and map from one of the dispensers located at each of the five entrances. Wheelchair access is available if requested at time of reservation. Each tour will last approximately 3 hours. Due to the length of the program, children must be at least eight years of age to participate.

There will be a \$5.00 per person reservation fee which will be collected at the beginning of the tour.

Evening Elk Tours (5:00 p.m.) will be conducted on the following dates:

September 6, 10, 12, 13, 17, 19, 20, 24, 26, 27 and October 1, 3, 4, 8, 10.

Early morning Elk Tours (6:30 a.m.) will ONLY be offered on the following Saturdays:

September 12, 26, and October 10.

The Refuge's public interpretive program is intended for individuals and family groups of six persons or less. Only one family's reservation will be accepted per telephone call. We regret we cannot offer group tours but invite all interested individuals to call for reservations which are taken on a first-come, first-served basis by telephoning the Refuge Visitor Center on the following line only: (580) 429-2151, beginning Monday, August 24 between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m.

Reservations will be retained until ten minutes prior to departure on each date. After that time, stand-bys will be accepted. If the bus seating capacity is filled after accepting stand-bys, late arrivals with reservations will not be able to participate.

Wiley Post Festival To Be Held In Maysville

The Maysville Public Library will host the 8th annual Wiley Post Festival September 3 through 5. Three days of live music, entertainment, vendors and a carnival with midway will begin September 3 at 8 p.m. with the showing of an outdoor movie on the corner of Main and Williams Street.

Saturday, September 5, Main and Williams Street will welcome over 20 different vendors. There will be vendors selling everything from jewelry and purses to art, quilts, crafts, candles, tattoos, and t-shirts. There will also be a host of great food, kettle corn, cotton candy, steak sandwiches to name a few.

Saturday will also feature some really great talent. Several great entertainers will be performing throughout the day.

At 11:30 a.m. Karissa Davis will take the stage and perform until 12 p.m. Karissa has been performing for several years now and is a regular with the Oklahoma Opry, Main Street Country Showcase in Denison, TX, and has opened shows for Blake Shelton.

Also performing will be Joe Slawson and Amber Fisher.

At 12 p.m. the Marlow gunfighters group will perform a Wild West gun fighting show that will involve the audience.

Children ages pre-k through sixth grade may participate in the money in the hay stack contest that will take place at 11 a.m. and 1:30 p.m.

The Air-Evac team will be landing the helicopter and allowing children to sit in the pilot seat for photos and a chance to check out the equipment. This is also the first year for the Ms. Wiley Post contest. Ladies 45 and older may participate by making pie for the silent pie auction that will be held in the library starting at 9 a.m. on the 5. Matchbook Memories

VINYL IS BACK

Déjà vu. What goes around comes around. Everything that's old is new again. We hear these statements as they apply to many things in the modern world. Now they apply to vinyl records. A recent television news story reported that video stores are beginning to stock vinyl records again. I was thrilled to hear that news. Although I have not seen any vinyl records in video stores, I hope that I will be able to pick up an album, feel its solid weight, see the creative cover design, and read the liner notes on the back of the album cover.

As I listened to the television news story, I wondered why music producers would want to issue the old vinyl disks again. The reporter explained that buyers are attracted to the nostalgic qualities of the recordings. They want to look at the covers as they did

long ago. They want to read the information on the back of the cover, which might give information about the artist, explanations of the lyrics, perhaps the complete lyrics of some of the songs, and even a brief history of the era of the music. Some buyers like to display their record collection much as a book collector displays his books. Some nostalgia buffs buy record players which resemble the beautiful phonograph cabinets of the World War II era. Others like the feel of placing a large record on a green felt turntable, gently lowering the phonograph arm onto the disk, and hearing the light scratching sound as the needle settles into the groove on the record. Some even enjoy the slight pause as one record is removed and another placed on the turntable. Perhaps some listeners enjoy the more

relaxed pace of the vinyl recordings as contrasted to the rapid sequence of ipod players.

In my young years, vinyl records were all we had. I have a collection of 33 1/3 rpm records, a large collection of 45 rpm recordings, and even a few 78 rpm records. I vaguely recall that in the late 1930s we had a wind-up Victrola record player in a wooden cabinet as tall as I was. We had only a few thick, heavy records, which my sister, Audrey, played over and over. One was Jimmie Rogers singing and yodeling on "Waiting for a Train." Sometimes the phonograph would run down in the middle of a song, causing the music to get slower and slower until someone turned the crank on the side and brought the music back up to speed.

"The Encyclopedia of Country Music" has a fascinating section on country music album covers. The section includes color pictures of 75 album covers, arranged in chronological order. The first picture shows the first Jimmie Rogers album entitled "Jimmie Rogers: America's Blue Yodeler." The second picture is an album cover entitled "Old Time Barn Dance" featuring Roy Acuff. Other notable album covers feature Woody Guthrie, Hank Williams, Lefty Frizzell, Patsy Cline, George Jones, Merle Haggard, and Dolly Parton. Scanning the 75 covers from first to last is like a historical tour of country music.

In the 1940s and 1950s, vinyl records were our main source of entertainment. We listened to the records as radio disc jockeys played them on country stations such as KLPR in Oklahoma City. A few Bradley kids were fortunate enough to own records and a phonograph to play them on. But mainly we listened to them on jukeboxes. Every cafe and bar had a brightly-lit jukebox. The jukeboxes

had neon lights across the front and around the sides. The neon tubes often had bubbles moving through the red, green, and blue tubes. The jukeboxes were almost always placed near the front door so that customers could insert coins and select songs even before they sat down. In those years, each song cost a nickel or six for a quarter. In some cafes and bars, the jukebox was seldom silent.

Recording artists judged their success by jukebox play. The more times their songs were played on the jukeboxes, the more money they earned. Don Helms, the steel guitar player for Hank Williams, tells how much Hank enjoyed stopping into small cafes late at night and listening to his own records and, especially, listening to pop vocalists such as Rosemary Clooney and Jo Stafford singing his songs. Records measured the success of a singer.

In our modern times of press releases, advertisements, and computer promotions, we are immediately aware of new recordings even before they go on the market. In the days of my youth, we first became aware of a new recording when

we heard it on the radio or on a jukebox. We might walk into Bomhak's Cafe in Bradley and hear Bob Wills' "Faded Love" for the first time. I recall in 1950 walking into Harold's Steak House, where Cable Printing is now located, and hearing the driving beat of Hank Snow's "I'm Movin' On" for the first time. We might have never seen even a picture of the singer, but the record identified the artist for us. Records became the personification of the singer.

In those days, we had only the records. Now we have CDs, ipods, television videos, and computer channels devoted entirely to certain types of music. And now recording companies are reviving the vinyl recordings that we grew up with. What can account for this return to the past? Perhaps it is nostalgia. Perhaps it is the satisfaction of holding a real object in our hand, much as book lovers enjoy holding a new book. Whatever the reason, I hope the new interest continues. Even though I probably have the songs on a small CD, I would still buy a new 33 1/3 recording of Merle, Hank, George, or Lefty just for the thrill of it.

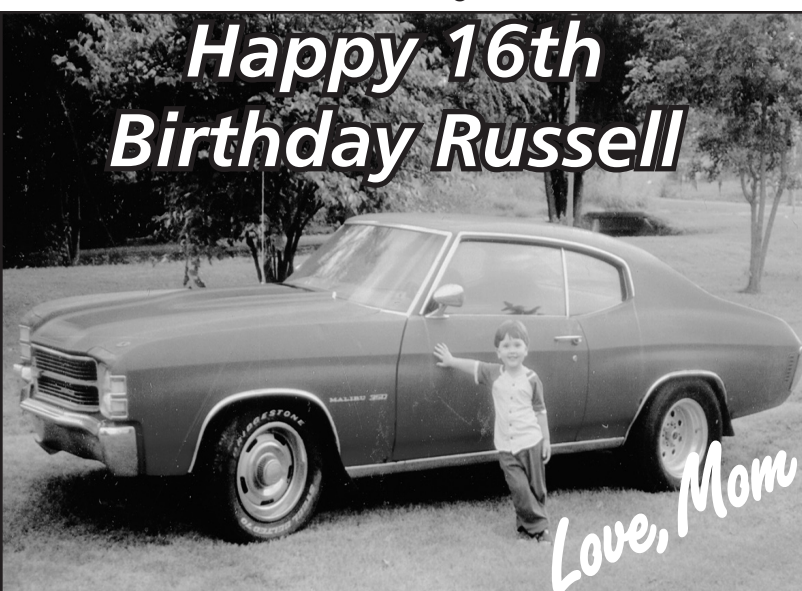

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Superintendent's Corner

With the spread on the 2009 H1N1 virus dominating much of the current media, I thought this would be a good time to provide you with information that has been provided to the school districts in regard to the control and managing of the virus. The following precautions have been provided to us by the State Department of Education and the Center for Disease Control.

1. Practice good hand hygiene by washing your hands often with soap and water, especially after coughing or sneezing. Alcohol-based hand cleaners are also effective. (We have ordered, and will soon be in the process of installing, hand disinfectant dispensers in some of our high contact areas.)

2. Cover your mouth and nose with tissue when you cough or sneeze. Dispose of these tissues properly. When tissues are not available cough or sneeze into your elbow or shoulder, not your hands.

3. Stay at home if you or your child is sick and has run a fever of 100 degrees for at least 24 hours after there is no longer a sign of fever.

4. It is also recommended that you get your family vaccinated for seasonal flu and 2009 H1N1 flu when vaccines are available.

5. Please remind your child not to share anything that

could facilitate transmission, such as make-up, drinks, or food.

6. Have a plan in place for child care at home if you or your child gets sick.

As a recent correspondence from the State Department of Education states, "There is no reason to panic about forecasts for an aggressive flu season. Yet, we must arm ourselves with information and be prepared." Some very useful website links providing information relating to the flu virus, which are also available on the Lindsay school website, are <http://h1n1.health.ok.gov> and www.flu.gov. The Lindsay school website can be accessed at www.Lindsay@k12.ok.us.

I would also like to take this opportunity to inform you of a new change that will be occurring this school year. We will be moving to a school wide online grading program soon. This program will allow parents to access their individual student's assignments, grades, and attendance reports from home. We have personnel attending training now, with the goal being to assign parent passwords before Christmas break. I sincerely appreciate our principals and teachers for taking on this task. We feel strongly that with this technology in place, parents can stay more positively involved in their child's educational process, and possibly head off

grade and attendance problems before they turn into bigger problems. We will be passing on further details regarding this exciting program in the future.

In closing, I would like to remind all parents to review the student handbook with your child. It is extremely important for parents, students, faculty, and administrators to all be on the "same page" in reference to school rules and regulations. Reviewing handbook requirements with your child, can save valuable time and stress as the school year advances.

And as always, thank each and every one of you for the support you continually give the Lindsay Public School system. Educating children truly is a team effort.

Michael Stephen Burnett 1949-2009

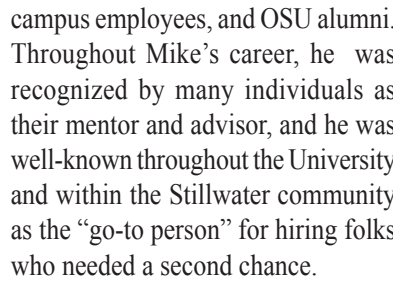


Michael Stephen Burnett passed from his earthly life and into the arms of his heavenly Father Thursday, August 20, 2009, at his home in Stillwater, OK.
