

Flu Vaccinations To Be Given **At Lindsay Schools Thursday**

system is providing voluntary immunizations with FluMist and/or the injectable flu vaccine. The immunizations will be Thursday, November 5, 2009 from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m. in the Lindsay Public School safe room located at the west end of the middle school.

It should be noted, the health department will be able to use the FluMist® vaccine without a parent being present, but there will need to be a parent present for the injectable vaccine. We cannot immunize anyone without the completed consent form. At this time, the health department has indicated they will vaccinate school age children and younger siblings of school age children.

2009 H1N1 influenza (also called Swine Flu) is caused by a new strain of influenza virus. It has spread to many countries.

Like other flu viruses, 2009 H1N1 spreads from person to person through coughing, sneezing, and sometimes through touching objects contaminated with the virus.

Signs of 2009 H1N1 can include: fatigue, fever, sore throat, muscle aches, chills,

The Lindsay School coughing and sneezing. Some people also have diarrhea and vomiting. Most people feel better within a week. But some people get pneumonia or other serious illnesses. Some people have to be hospitalized and some die.

> Seasonal flu viruses change from year to year, but they are closely related to each other. People who have had flu infections in the past usually have some immunity to seasonal flu viruses (their bodies have built up some ability to fight off the viruses). The 2009 H1N1 flu is a new flu virus. It is very different from seasonal flu viruses. Most people have little or no immunity to 2009 H1N1 flu (their bodies are not prepared to fight off the virus).

Vaccines are available to protect against 2009 H1N1 influenza.

These vaccines are made just like seasonal flu vaccines. They are expected to be as safe and effective as seasonal flu vaccines. They will not prevent ìinfluenza-like illnesses caused by other viruses. They will not prevent seasonal flu. You should also get seasonal influenza vaccine, if you want to be protected against seasonal flu. Inactivated vaccine (vaccine that has killed virus in it) is injected into the muscle, like the annual flu shot.

Groups recommended to receive 2009 H1N1 vaccine first are: pregnant women, people who live with or care for infants younger than 6 months of age, health care and emergency medical personnel, anyone from 6 months through 24 years of age, anyone from 25 through 64 years of age with certain chronic medical conditons or a weakened immune system.

The Federal government is providing this vaccine for receipt on a voluntary basis. However, state law or employers may require vaccination for certain persons.

Get vaccinated as soon as the vaccine is available. Children through 9 years of age should get two doses of vaccine, about a month apart. Older children and adults need only one dose.

o Offer Assistance With Heating This Winter

Help with home heating costs will be available across the state this winter through the federal Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program administered by the Oklahoma Department of Human Services,

The application period for assistance through OKDHS will begin Tuesday, December 1. Applications will be accepted until allocated funding is spent.

Funding for winter heating assistance in Oklahoma is projected to be approximately \$18 million. Last year, OKDHS served more than 100,000 households during the winter heating assistance program.

"Many, but not all households that receive public assistance through OKDHS may be automatically authorized for LIHEAP and will not need to make application. These households will be notified of their eligibility," said Cari Crittenden, OKDHS LIHEAP coordinator. She also encouraged those who are usually pre-approved to make application at their local OKDHS office if they have recently moved or did not receive a pre-approval notice this year.

Most other households that receive some type of public assistance, such as the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (formerly known as Food Stamps), Temporary Assistance for Needy Families or state supplemental payments to the aged, blind or disabled will be mailed LIHEAP applications

Eligibility for help through LIHEAP is based on household income and assets. Low-income households that do not receive public assistance may also be eligible for home heating

"It is important that persons

requesting LIHEAP assistance have their household's latest heating bill and income information when applying," Crittenden added.

The maximum income guidelines are: one member of a household \$1, 174; two members \$1,579; three members, \$1,984; four members \$2,380; five members \$2,794; six members \$3,200; seven members \$3,605; and eight members \$4,010.

Matchbook **Memories**

TIMES CHANGES EVERYTHING **PART III**

Days were pleasantly long in my boyhood days during World War II. There was always time to play, to take naps, and to enjoy time with Collie, my beloved dog. And at the end of the day, there still remained the evening hours before a pleasant night's sleep. Even though we always went to bed early, the evening hours were important in our family. For about two hours after supper, we enjoyed an important family time. Those two hours seemed longer than they do now in our hurried lives.

After my mother finished the supper dishes, she would join the rest of us in the living room and dining room of our farm house. Winter evenings were the best. Our two kerosene lamps would cast a warm glow. The wood heater would warm both rooms as the cold north wind rattled the windows.

The battery radio would play our favorite programs, perhaps "The Bob Burns Show," "Fibber McGee and Molly," or "The Lum and Abner Show." Collie and I would lie on the linoleum floor near the heater. I recall how secure I felt as I dozed beside my dog.

Every night at about 7:30, my mother would carry one of the kerosene lamps to our large oak library table to write her nightly letter to my brother, Jim. No matter how hard she had worked all day, she always had time to write to Jim. I still have the small blue writing folder that held her v-mail stationery. The vmail stationery was designed to conserve weight and space as it was shipped to far away lands where our troops were fighting in the greatest war. A v-mail letter was one sheet of very light paper, much like parchment paper today. On side was for writing, and the other side was for the address when the sheet was folded for mailing. She would pull up a heavy oak chair and begin her short v-mail letter.

After she finished, Collie and I would write a sentence or two at the bottom of the letter. After I had written, Collie would climb up into the chair and put his paws on the table. I would put the pencil between his toes on his left paw and slowly print COLLIE on the paper. Since I was left-handed, I thought Collie was left-footed. He would watch with interest. I thought he understood that he was writing to Jim. When Jim came home, he told us how important those letters were as he flew through the dangerous skies over Europe. Before we would go to bed, Collie and I would listen as my mother said a long prayer asking God to protect Jim and bring him safely home. Even though we never stayed up late, there was always time for the letters and the prayers before bedtime, generally before 9:00 p.m.

On cold winter nights, I would lie in bed in the unheated bedroom, buried in the soft feather bed, on a fluffy feather pillow, under a pile of handmade quilts, and think back over the day. It would seem so long since I had awakened at 6:a.m. I would go to sleep recounting the events of the day. I would wonder if Collie was remembering his day too. My mother would not let him sleep by my bed. He had his own bed in the corner of our screened-in back porch. I knew

he was sleeping comfortably in his bed of an old quilt, warmed by his long, soft hair.

After a long day, I always slept soundly through a long night. In those innocent times, I never woke up at night sleepless and worried about the day to come. The long days and long nights flowed endlessly into each other. It seemed that time almost stood still. Now the days seem to speed by, fragmented and hectic. I frequently think of a line from a poem by Andrew Marvell: "But at my back I always hear time's winged chariot hurrying near." But, once upon a time, it was different, in the days of

Flu Vaccination Clinic To Be Held Saturday

The Garvin County Health Department announced today that it will hold an H1N1 vaccination clinic Saturday, Nov. 7th from 8:00 to 12:00 at the Pauls Valley clinic, 1809 S. Chickasaw. The clinics will be limited to Oklahoma residents who are in one of five priority groups.

Priority groups for the H1N1 vaccine include:

- All children ages six months to 18 years.
 - Pregnant women.
- Custodial parents of infants less than six months of
- Front-line health care workers who have direct patient contact with acutely ill persons.
- Adults 19 64 years of age with chronic disease.

"The H1N1 flu virus continues to affect people in our community," said Garvin County Health Department Administrative

Director Mike Milton. "We know that the people in these priority groups are at greater risk and we hope to reach as many of them as vaccine supplies allow on

People seeking vaccinations will be screened to ensure that they meet the priority group definition for H1N1 vaccine. People not included in one of the priority groups or who are unable to attend Saturday's clinic are encouraged to be patient, as new vaccine shipments arrive in Oklahoma each week.

The Oklahoma State Department of Health is projected to receive H1N1 vaccine in weekly shipments through early January 2010. The doses include both nasal spray and injectable vaccines.





Dear Parent/Guardian:

As you are well aware, flu season has arrived. This year we are helping to prevent the further spread of the 2009 H1N1 and seasonal flu by providing voluntary immunizations with FluMist® and/or the injectable flu vaccine. Keeping students and teachers healthy and in school is important for their education. Avoiding missed days of school means avoiding missed lessons.

We have had children sick with the flu for a week or more. Additionally, flu in children can be serious and can cause: fever, headache, extreme fatigue, and body aches. Children with underlying health conditions such as asthma or diabetes may become ill enough to require hospitalization. Children are often the main source of flu infection for everyone else, spreading the flu to other classmates, family members, and the community.

According to the Garvin County Health Department, the single best way to help prevent the spread of the 2009 H1N1 and seasonal flu is to get a flu vaccination each year. As a result, we will be implementing a school vaccination program for the Lindsay Public School students on Thursday, November 5, 2009 from 1:00 P.M.-6:00 P.M. in the Lindsay Public School safe room located at the west end of the middle school.

To give your consent to have your child vaccinated with the FluMist® and/or injectable flu vaccine, please read the material that was recently sent home with your child and return the consent form to your child's school by Wednesday, November 4, 2009. It should be noted, the health department will be able to use the FluMist® vaccine without a parent being present, but there will need to be a parent present for the injectable vaccine. We cannot <u>immunize anyone</u> without the completed consent form. At this time, the health department has indicated they will vaccinate school age children and younger siblings of school age children.

We encourage you to contact your child's healthcare provider if you have additional questions about the flu vaccine or contact the H1N1 Hot Line at 1-866-278-7134.

Lindsay Leopard Football

Lindsay travelled to Comanche to play the Indians Friday night. The Indians were fighting to stay in the play-off hunt and would give the Leopards all they wanted.

The first half was a defensive battle with Comanche scoring their first touchdown of the game on a 16 yard pass with just 2:17 remaining in the first half. The extra point was no good. The Leopards would answer when Scott Hacker connected with Stephon Bradley on a 63 yard pass with 1:49 remaining in the half. Josiah Harrison missed the extra point and the score at half ended with both teams knotted up at 6-6.

The second half would be an emotional roller coaster for both teams. Comanche would come out of halftime very inspired and score on their first series of the half on an 18 pass for the touchdown. They would make the extra point and led Lindsay 13-6 early in the second half. The Leopards would answer on their second drive of the half when Scott Hacker scored on a 1 yard touchdown run after starting the drive on the 22 yard line of Comanche. The extra point was missed and the Leopards trailed 13-12.

On their next series the Indians were driving down the field when Carson Tate tackled the Comanche running back and injured his back. Carson left the field in an ambulance and later Medi-Flighted to Oklahoma City where he was later released.

The Indians took advantage on the delay and drove the ball down the field. Comanche appeared to have scored on a 21 yard pass but instead fumbled the ball into the end zone and out the side for a touchback and the Leopards received a big break. The Leopards couldn't capitalize on the turnover and turned the ball back over to Comanche on an interception.

The Indians were driving for another touchdown when Aaron Smith intercepted a Comanche pass and ran it back for 77 yards to the Indian 2 yard line. From there Scott Hacker would run it in for the Leopard's first lead of the night. The Leopards converted the 2 point attempt and led 20-13.

Comanche wouldn't give up and had 2 drives deep in Leopard territory only to have them stopped on interceptions by Josiah Harrison and Zack Ernst.

The Leopards would come away with an emotional victory 20-13 and would lock up second place in District

Leading rusher for Lindsay was John Pinnick with 20 yards on 8 carries. Scott Hacker would throw 10 completions on 26 attempts for 160 yards and 1 touchdown. The leading receiver would be Stephon Bradley with 1 catch for 63 yards and 1 touchdown.

Other Leopards with carries were Aaron Smith with 6 yards on 2 carries, Kris Milligan with 3 yards on 2 carries, Stephon Bradley with 2 yards on 5 carries, Zach Bustillios with 1 carry for 0 yards and Scott Hacker with -9 yards on 10 carries and 2 touchdowns. Other Leopards with receptions were Carson Tate with 49 yards on 5 catches, Aaron Smith with 30 yards on 2 catches, and Kris Milligan and Jake Bowen with 9 yards on 1 catch each.

Leading the defense in tackles were Carson Tate, John Pinnick and Zack Ernst with 11 tackles each. Following them in tackles was Kris Milligan with 10 tackles, Aaron Smith with 8 tackles, John Holliman with 7 tackles, Mason Blake with 6 tackles, Chris Larrauri with 5 tackles, Jake Bowen and Josiah Harrison with 4 tackles, Stephon Bradley and Dakota Mills with 3 tackles, and Ethan Griffith and Zack Bustillos with 1 tackle. 

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

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
